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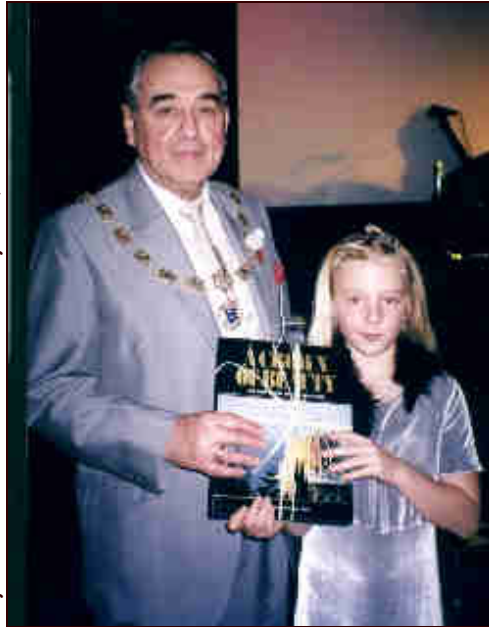

### Festival of Faiths in Kingston

ON SUNDAY, December 9, a Festival of the faiths was held at the North Kingston centre. Many dignitaries and VIPs attended including Baroness Sarah Ludford MEP, Dr Jenny Tong MP, John Azah, Director of Kingston Racial Equality Council and religious leaders from churches, synagogues mosques and temples, including Bahá'ís.

I was able to give a talk at the end of the other religious talks (I had requested to be last) and spoke of unity, world peace and the oneness of God, religion and all humanity. I also said the prayer for humankind.

Afterwards Amir Choudhry the presenter from Positive Consensus and ex-Mayor Shiraz Mirza, along with several others came to ask where such a prayer had come from. Both are Muslims. They each asked for a copy of 'Abdu'l-Bahá's prayer and this has led to me being asked to join their group and speak again in the future. I had been so nervous previously but needn't have been because Bahá'u'lláh put the word into my brain which flowed not from me but from His writings.

### Interfaith Devotional Meeting

ON, Sunday, 30 December at All Saints Church in Kingston Upon Thames, the reverend Bill Bates held an Interfaith Devotional where each religion was asked to speak about events relating to the September 11th bombing in the United States of America.

The church was full with its normal congregation besides a number of guests from the various faiths. We were each asked to light a candle and place it as a symbol of light and peace in the world. Among the guests were the Bishop of Kingston in his purple robes the

Reverend Bates, Rabbi Danny Rich, Sikhs, Muslims and humanists, and I represented the Bahá'í Faith.

Each spoke in turn about their thoughts on September 11th. When it came to my turn I began with the Prayer for Mankind then used the writings of Bahá'u'lláh to show our Unity and teachings of oneness of religion and God and humanity. I finished with a statement on religious tolerance which I requested each representative to sign. Most did except the humanist. Most of my community were away for the Christmas holidays which is why I accepted to do this.

It was a very rewarding experience as at first I had been nervous about speaking in such imposing surroundings and illustrious company. But I need not have worried as the Concourse on High came to my rescue and showed me what to say after the prayer and requests for help.

To anyone else who is nervous about speaking in public I would say: don't worry, just pray beforehand and go out there and do it.

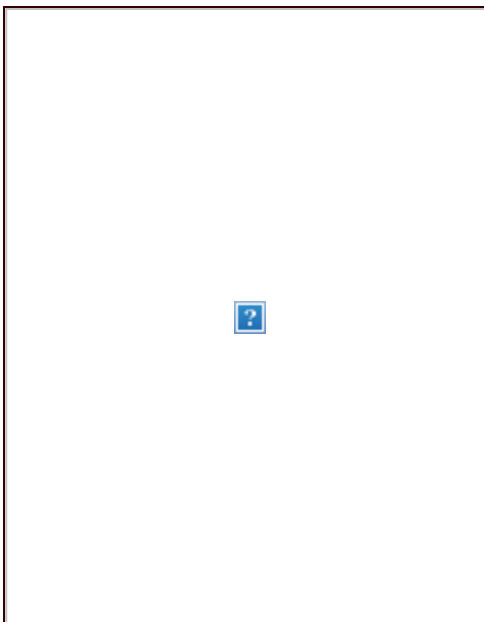

October brought One World Week. Mary, who serves on the committee, gave her annual "Morning Thought" on Radio Jersey which was very well received. A copy of the script was sent to the Jersey Evening Post and was published with a by-line. This was the first time a selection from several scriptures has been printed in the paper. The vicar of Gouray Church, who also serves on the committee, asked Mary to give the address at Mass on the last Sunday of the month. He asked her to explain the connection between the Bahá'í Faith and the aims of One World Week and to share the "Morning Thought". There was a wonderfully receptive congregation of around forty people, many of whom came to offer congratulations and ask her to talk again.

On October 27 a small group gathered at our Unity Tree, planted during the Centenary Year, to take part in a short programme of prayer and meditation. Our tiny, fragile sapling has grown into a fine oak tree. Catherine was a baby when it was planted and we couldn't resist taking of photograph of her, ten years old, standing beneath it having gathered some of its mature acorns.

In November, for the second year running, we had a stall at the Natural Health Exhibition. Our stall was popular and 225 pieces of literature were taken by visitors. The display included three posters of the Terraces, literature and offerings of fruit, nuts and pieces of bread interspersed with quotations about health, serenity and our responsibility for the environment. For Bahá'u'lláh's Birthday we had a small fireside and showed the video "The Prisoner of 'Akká". One lady asked to borrow the tape for a Christian study group.

We have planned a World Religion Day multi-faith meeting for January and the Vicar of Gourlay has kindly offered the use of a comfortable area in the church. He has also asked Mary to give a talk on World Religion Day at the Mass on Sunday, January 20.

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## International One World Week in York

ON SATURDAY, October 27, the annual International One World Week was held in York, jointly arranged by York Bahá'ís and four other groups who form the International Meal Committee. It was felt to be one of the best ever held with about 115 people from 14 different countries attending.

As in recent years, the meal was again a “Bring and Share” event, with many wonderful dishes being provided by those attending. However many people come, there is always enough to eat. Entertainment before the meal was provided this year by three groups of young people from York’s Performing Arts Centre. Two of the groups were dancers and the third was drummers who were outstanding. Following the meal there was Circle Dancing. Everyone enjoyed the evening so much that they were loath to leave, staying on much later than in previous years. We hope to be able to make the event even better next year thanks to generous grants from two Trusts in York.

York community now has a Study Circle up and running, which has called itself The Blossoming Souls. Led by Daryoush Mazloum, the Circle has nine other members, one of whom is a non-Bahá'í. The Circle will be hosting the celebration of the Birth of Bahá'u'lláh and providing food from the five different countries represented in the group.



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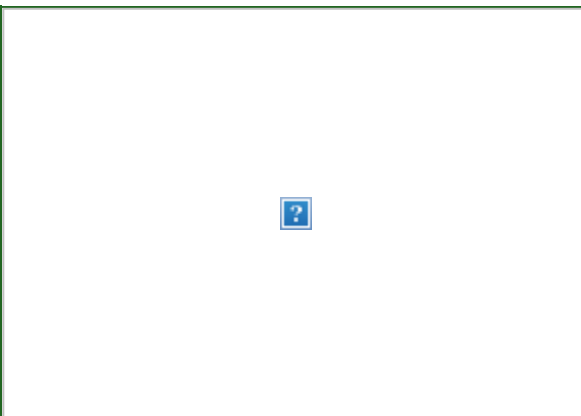
## Sutton community grows in numbers to celebrate the Birthday of Bahá'u'lláh

We think we’re all a good working twenty first century version of unity in diversity and sometimes I think the members of the Concourse on High must be having a good laugh at our antics as we zoom around the world in eighty minutes, laughing and crying and helping each other become World Citizens here in the heart of England.
